RILEY REQUESTS BOARD TO PLAN NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

Charlotte Riley, speaking on behalf of local Girl Scouts, requested the Board to consider planning neighborhood parks including playgrounds, jogging and bicycle trails, a track, picnic areas, etc., things which would be more conducive to the overall community, rather than total concentration on baseball/softball/soccer facilities, and stated that local families would be interested in assisting the City with fundraising and actual construction of this type of facilities. Copies of her written suggestions were given to the Clerk for distribution, with a copy on file in the Office of the City Clerk for review by any interested party. **NO BOARD ACTION** taken.

LOW BID ACCEPTED FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT TELE-COMMUNICATION SYSTEM

As shown by proof of publication found on page 703 of this Minute Book V that sealed bids would be received for a telecommunication system for the Clinton Police Department, said bids were received with a copy of the Bid Tabulation being found on page 704 of this Minute Book V. **MOTION** made by Alderman Valente and **SECONDED** by Alderman Todd to accept the low bid of S T & T Communications at a total cost of \$6,603.30. **MOTION CARRIED 7-0** with Alderman Lott abstaining due to his employment with South Central Bell.

SPECIAL EXCEPTION REQUEST FOR ELDERLY HOUSING COMPLEX DISMISSED WITHOUT PREJUDICE

Upon the unanimous recommendation of the City of Clinton Planning and Zoning Board to dismiss without prejudice the special exception request of Mr. J. T. Cleveland and I. H. Cronin, M.D., to place an elderly housing complex at the corner of Northside Drive and Pinehaven Drive, noting that no one had been present for the last three consecutive Planning and Zoning Board Meetings to present said case, and that dismissing without prejudice would allow said applicants to re-apply if they so desire, **MOTION** made by Alderman Montgomery and **SECONDED** by Alderman Lott to dismiss without prejudice. **MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.**

PRELIMINARY PLAT OF BAY PARK OF CASCADES SUBDIVISION ACCEPTED

MOTION made by Alderman Montgomery and **SECONDED** by Alderman Johnson to approve that preliminary plat of Bay Park of Cascades Subdivision as presented. **MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.**

CITY TO APPLY FOR \$14,000.00 GRANT TO PLANT TREES

Following presentation by Jehu Brabham in which he stated that a \$14,850.00 tree grant through the Small Business Administration was available to apply for (55% Federal monies; 45% local and the local can be in-kind contribution); and that both of our local nurseries had contributed landscape design plans and were willing to help contribute plantings; and stated that plans for distribution of said funds if received will be to plant trees (1) in Robinson Park; (2) from I-20 down to Highway 80 (a boulevard type setting); and (3) down Northside Drive in front of Northside Square Shopping Center area. **MOTION** made by Alderman Valente and **SECONDED** by Alderman Ferrell to authorize Mayor Smith to sign said grant application on behalf of the City of Clinton to obtain these grant funds and proceed with said project as stated. **MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.** Copy of said grant application may be found on pages 705-725 of this Minute Book V.

Alderman Montgomery stating that the Riverwood Sewer Problem not quite being ready for presentation requested said matter be omitted from the agenda until a later date. NO BOARD ACTION.

CITY ENGINEER TO BRING PLAN FOR COLLEGE HILLS SEWER

MOTION made by Alderman Valente and SECONDED by Alderman Ferrell to authorize City Engineer Broome to study the present very preliminary plan for sewer provision in College Hills and to bring a specific plan for provision of sewerage to 104 and 107 Auburn Drive with contingency plans for further extension into College Hills Subdivision. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

MAYOR SMITH AUTHORIZED TO OFFER PROPOSAL TO SCHOOL BOARD FOR LAND TO RELOCATE THE BRIARS TREATMENT PLANT

Upon Mayor Smith's request to be authorized for negotiation purposes to make a proposal to the School Board next Tuesday night upon advice from the City Attorney, Engineer, Public Works Director, and any alderman that can be located immediately upon receipt of the appraisal for School Board land located north of Northside Drive to be used for the relocation of the Briars Treatment Plant, MOTION made by Alderman Montgomery and SECONDED by Alderman Valente to authorize Mayor Smith to make a proposal to the School Board for the appraisal price with actual agreement to come back to the Board of Aldermen for final approval. MOTION CARRIED 7-0 with Alderman Todd abstaining due to a possible conflict of interest.

ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT FOR COTTON ACRES SEWER

MOTION made by Alderman Valente and SECONDED by Alderman Ferrell to approve that Resolution found on pages 726-727 of this Minute Book V authorizing a special assessment district for Cotton Acres Subdivision for sanitary sewer facilities. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. It was noted by City Attorney Spell that the Public Works Director and City Engineer need to make the appropriate attachments to said resolution prior to publication. GRADE 15 ADDED TO LTC ON CITY CLASSIFICATION PLAN

MOTION made by Alderman Ferrell and SECONDED by Alderman Lott to add the position of Water/Wastewater Operator to the City Compensation Classification Plan, Grade 15, under (LTC) Labor, Trades, & Crafts. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

MAYOR AUTHORIZED TO NEGOTIATE WITH SANDRA GRAY REGARDING ROBINSON SCS PROJECT

MOTION made by Alderman Ferrell and SECONDED by Alderman Ryan to authorize Mayor Smith to continue negotiations with Sandra Gray regarding the Robinson SCS Project to a point where a definitive offer might be made with said offer being brought back to the Board of Aldermen for final approval. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

DEDICATION OF OLD SOUTHWEST LAGOON FOR PARK USE

MOTION made by Alderman Ferrell and SECONDED by Alderman Johnson to adopt that Resolution found on pages 728-729 of this Minute Book V dedicating the land at the old southwest lagoon exclusively for park and recreational uses. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AUTHORIZATION TO CONTRACT AS NEEDED FOR EMERGENCY BUILDING INSPECTOR AND ENGINEER WHEN IN-HOUSE CONFLICTS ARISE

MOTION made by Alderman Johnson and SECONDED by Alderman Ferrell empowering the Public Works Director with the Mayor's

approval in cases of emergency (such as the disablement of our current building inspector) the authority to employ or contract on a part-time basis as needed a building inspector. Prior to a vote being taken, Alderman Montgomery MOVED to amend the motion to include an engineer when in-house conflicts require outside review by an engineer other than the current City Engineer. SECONDED by Alderman Valente. AMENDMENT TO THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY AND MOTION-AS-AMENDED CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Public Works Director Alderman was directed by the Mayor to have a written document drawn up on a City-styled form to be used by these contracted individuals (both building inspector and engineer) guaranteeing the City that there will be no conflict of interest on their individual part on any project or duty assigned to them under contract; that if a conflict of interest should arise that they will not perform any such work and will expect the City to employ or retain yet another individual in such matters.

At 8:20 p.m. Mayor Smith called for a break to enjoy the refreshments graciously prepared and served by the City of Clinton Maids and Matrons Club. At 8:40 p.m., Mayor Smith called the meeting back to order and proceeded with the "Other Business" items.

LOW BID ACCEPTED FOR CONCRETE CONSTRUCTION OF PAVILION AT TRACEWAY PARK

MOTION made by Alderman Johnson and SECONDED by Alderman Ryan to approve the low bid of Spencer Ready Mix @ \$46.50/yd. for concrete for construction of a pavilion at Traceway park and finishing work, noting that the Clinton High School Vo-Tech will be doing all of the other labor and the only cost to the City will be for concrete material and finishing, estimated at approximately \$3-4,000.00 total cost. MOTION CARRIED 6-1 with Alderman Montgomery casting the "nay" vote due to it requiring expenditures of a non-emergency nature. Quotes for the concrete material may be found in the Office of the City Clerk.

AUTHORIZATION GRANTED TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS FOR NEW FIRE ENGINE

MOTION made by Alderman Montgomery and SECONDED by Alderman Valente granting authorization to advertise for bids for a new fire engine. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION REQUESTING MORE SCRUTINY IN DISTRIBUTION OF FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION FUNDS INCLUDING BRIDGE REPLACEMENT AND REHABILITATION FUNDS

MOTION made by Alderman Ferrell and SECONDED by Alderman Ryan to adopt that Resolution found on pages 730-731 of this Minute Book V requesting the Mississippi Transportation Commission to examine the distribution of all federal transportation funds, including bridge replacement and rehabilitation funds, to determine a more equitable distribution of funds for the transportation systems located within the corporate limits of municipalities without regard to population. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

BOARD ENDORSES ESSAY WRITING CONTEST AND AUTHORIZES PRIZES

MOTION made by Alderman Valente and SECONDED by Alderman Montgomery to endorse the Jr. High and Sr. High essay writing contest sponsored by the Governor's Office in conjunction with Mississippi Homecoming entitled "Why I should pursue a career in Mississippi" and authorize 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place prizes in each of the Jr. and Sr. High Divisions from the City of Clinton in a savings bond monetary amount of \$100, \$75, and \$50 each totaling \$225.00 for the two divisions. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

RECYCLING UPDATE

Alderman Valente reported that Magnolia Disposal Services stated that there had been pretty good compliance with the new recycling procedures advertised and that they had just entered an agreement with MS Waste Paper for recycling and said recyclables seem to be increasing weekly. NO BOARD ACTION.

UPDATES TO BE GIVEN AT NEXT BOARD MEETING ON LOVETT LAGOON AND POLICE/COURTROOM FACILITY

Mayor Smith stated that updates would be given at the next Board Meeting on the Lovett Lagoon and the Police/Courtroom Facility. NO BOARD ACTION.

There being no further business to discuss, MOTION made by Alderman Johnson and SECONDED by Alderman Ryan to Recess until October 20, 1992, 5 P.M., at the Municipal Courtroom. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

RE: Urban Forestation Matching Grant Proposal

Dear Fellow Clintonians:

As you know over the past several years I have been trying to initiate a very aggressive community beautification and urban forestation program for Clinton. I thank you for your support and encouragement in this effort.

I take great satisfaction in the work already accomplished, but there is still tremendous work to be done. There are many wonderful opportunities in the area of urban forestation available that will further enhance our lovely community.

My personal dream is to see a hardy variety of thousands of trees such as crepe myrtles, oaks, willows, cypress, river birch, dogwoods, etc. planted in our city parks, public spaces and alongside our streets and roadways.

Much like in the Bible when it says, "The fields are white unto harvest, but the laborers are few," so it is with our urban forestation dream. We have plentiful opportunities for planting, but the money to purchase the tree stock is few !

However having limited money has not dampened nor deterred my enthusiasm for planting trees. I've had to do more research and study to find alternate sources of money for our urban forestation project. Recently, through the Congressional Research Service, I discovered some unspent 1991 federal funds for urban forestation that would be lost to Mississippi if not spent by the end of 1992. After some consultation and discussion with the State Forestry Commission I have received approval to submit a local matching grant proposal from Clinton for this small amount of unused funds.

Under this proposal the city / local organization must match dollars or "in kind" contributions the amount of federal dollars requested. The proposed program is a 45% local, 55 % federal matching program. Specifically, if we would like to receive \$ 14,850 for tree planting, we would have to come up with gifts of actual dollars or "in kind" gifts of labor, time, machinery, planting plans, landscape design work, etc, that would equal \$ 12,150.

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In order to meet the grant deadline of October 31 st, I have to put together a proposal listing the amount of matching dollars and the proposed amount of trees that could be planted for the dollars requested. Upon approval of our proposal our city will be authorized to advertise for bids, among our two Clinton nurseries, the tree stock and planting work . Hopefully, we can divide the tree planting grant among both our nurseries.

I think \$ 14,850 of grant money can have a significant impact upon both the beauty of our community as well as the economic impact upon our two local nurseries. Additionally, a tree planting project such as this would cause all involved to look back years from now with great satisfaction and pride upon the trees planted and the urban forestation heritage left to future generations.

Attached is the grant proposal. This proposal reflects a bold and aggressive approach on the part of our Clinton Beautification and Urban Forestation project. The proposal has been enthusiastically endorsed by our two local nurserymen. In fact much of the

" In Kind " matching contribution toward the our 45 % local participation comes from our local nurserymen. Both have spent hours in reviewing sites, drawing up detailed landscape plans, and offering to contribute man hours and expertise in planting and maintaining the trees. Their contributions are based, not on merely what they may gain from the project, but rather on their making a positive contribution toward making our Clinton community a more attractive place to live. For their attitude, help and spirit I am sincerely grateful.

I am requesting from our city help in two specific ways. 1) a contribution of \$ 1,000 toward the purchase of tree stock. This contribution sends a clear signal to the Forestry Commission that our city is committed to the urban forestation program. 2) as in other grant proposals the city would contribute " In Kind " help in the areas of manpower and machinery in the planting, watering, maintaining, etc. the trees.

On behalf of the Clinton Beautification and Urban Forestation project I thank you once again for your support of this community enhancing effort. I believe this proposal is just one more step on the way toward making our Clinton community the most beautiful, attractive and environmentally conscious communities in Mississippi. I am glad to be a part of our wonderful Clinton family!

II. Project Objective

Our overall objective is to further undergird, enhance and strengthen the long term community beautification and urban forestation program in Clinton. This project application reflects another key component in an overall comprehensive plan that is intended to impact the aesthetic beauty, environmental concerns and public consciousness of Clinton.

This phase of our urban forestation plan desires to use the approved funds for planting trees in our parks, in the reclamation of a sewage lagoon area, in public spaces and along roadsides. Clintonians are justifiably concerned with the quality of their environment, and reclamation projects, roadsides and parks are common areas with latent potential for beautification and urban forestation.

By continuing our already successful urban forestation program, Clinton will cultivate more than just trees. We begin by involving people with an interest in community development with natural elements. The civic governmental leadership, Chamber of Commerce, businesses and interested citizens are leading the way by a commitment toward urban forestation and beautification. By linking the people who are interested and knowledgeable about urban forestation with the resources for planting, we develop a program of community involvement and development that has lasting educational, ecological and aesthetic benefits.

III. Tree Planting Location

A special Clinton Beautification Committee serves as a task force in identifying those areas of Clinton with urban forestation needs and potential. This task force by way of public input, on site analysis, and funding limitations then establishes the types of plantings and the priority of the sites. The following is a general outline of our prioritized planting plan for this application:

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A. Reclamation of Sewage Lagoon Area ... The City of Clinton has recently closed one of its existing sewage lagoon areas. Upon closure, Clinton citizens have asked the city to reclaim this area for use as a neighborhood day park. The City of Clinton has responded favorably to the request for reclamation of this sewage lagoon area and work in proceeding to that end. Hopefully, within a few months the area will be ready for site preparation for a new neighborhood community park. Our urban forestation task force has identified this area as a top priority for utilization of funds received through this grant application.

Since this will be a park area the placement and size of the plantings will be determined by the local conditions of the park area. It is our plan to utilize many different and diverse species of trees in the park, with an accent upon our Southern heritage, such as crepe myrtles, dogwoods, oaks, cypress, magnolias, wild plum, crab apple and persimmon.

B. Enhancement of Robinson Park ... Robinson Park is a small community neighborhood park located in a minority section of the Clinton community. For many years Robinson Park has been gradually deteriorating. Over the past months there has been an expressed interest among Clinton citizens to rehabilitate and revitalize Robinson Park. Our task force has identified the urban forestation work needed in Robinson Park to be one of major community impact. Thus the recommendation to place this area near the top of our priority list.

It is our plan to plant those trees in Robinson Park that will provide aesthetic beauty as well as practical application such as shade for the children and adults utilizing the park facility.

Additionally, our Task Force is highly recommending that urban forestation funds be used to enhance the forest canopy in all our Clinton park areas. This we believe will have a significant impact upon the urban forestation consciousness of our citizenry.

C. Enhancement of Public Spaces ... There are numerous public spaces around Clinton that have been identified by our Task Force for urban forestation work. One such place is the new City Hall and Municipal Building. This new facility is located in the historic section known as Old Towne Clinton. During construction of this facility it was necessary to remove several large, stately oak trees. The Task Force identified the urban forestation landscaping of this new municipal building as a worthy project for funding under this application.

Plans are to plant those trees which will conform to the available space requirements of the area. Species plantings such as dogwoods and crepe myrtles will tie into the already established urban forestation plan for the Old Towne section of our beautiful community.

Other community public spaces that have been reviewed by the Task Force for urban forestation work include highly visible highway roadsides within our city. Some roadside areas have been subject to the widening of the traffic area and resulting relocation of utility lines. This expansion work caused the removal of many trees which now leads to the definite need of urban forestation. Additional roadside urban forestation development within the business district of Clinton has been identified as a high profile urban forestation area.

A vicinity map and landscape design sketches are located on the next pages of this application. Please note the intent of our Task Force is to implement urban forestation plans that will impact the different sections of our Clinton community. Our urban forestation plan is not isolated in one area of Clinton, but rather touches many different areas.

IV. Planting Standards

For this project, the City of Clinton and local Small Business nurserymen. will provide the professional expertise in meeting the criteria for site preparation, planting stock care and selection and planting. The urban forestation plan for Clinton will follow the standards and guidelines as set forth in the Forestry Handbook and the Natural Resources Development Program printed material. The planting stock will meet the specifications of the American Standard for Nursery Stock. All plantings, maintenance and care will conform to the reasonable and customary standards of urban forestation.

V. Administration and Staffing

The Mayor of Clinton will administer the project through the Director of Public Works, upon recommendations and suggestions of the Chairman of the Beautification Committee and Task Force. On site administration will be provided by professional small business nurserymen in the Clinton community. Fiscal oversight will be

provided through the office of the City Clerk, which shall administer the project budget.

VI. Maintenance Plans

At the completion of the planting phase of this project the Chairman of the Community Beautification Committee in consultation with other involved parties will summarize their efforts by preparing and submitting to the Mayor and City Council a written report. A key component of this report will be a recommended procedure for the protection of the plantings with continued maintenance. This maintenance to include:

- a) The watering of the plantings during the establishment period by the fire department and other city public works employees
- b) Pruning and fertilizing the plantings upon recommendation of local small business nurserymen
- c) Utilizing the mulch created from our Clinton Christmas tree recycling program to mulch the area around the base of the plantings

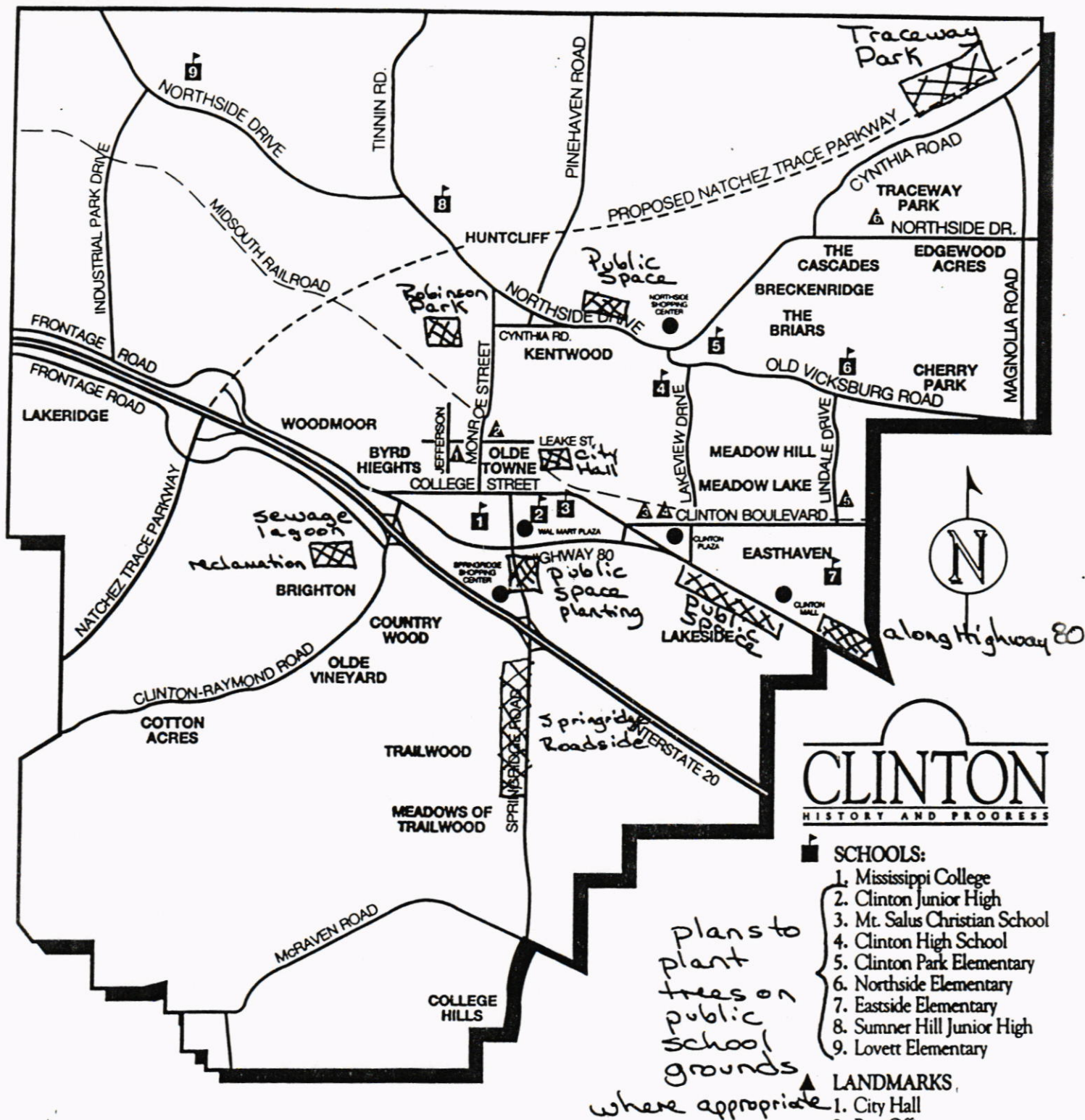
VII. Desired Results

One of the foundation stones upon which our Clinton Urban Forestation program is built is the wise and prudent use of those appropriated funds. It is our desire to get the very best return available on the grant funds supplied under the SBA Natural Resources Development Program.

As Clinton continues to develop a distinct pride in urban forestation, implements tree protection ordinances, expands its community recycling efforts, and addresses modern environmental and

Listed below is a general narrative of the budget costs for this phase of the Clinton Urban Forestation Project. On succeeding pages following the narrative is a detailed explanation of the the plant specification guide, labor projections, supplies, maintenance, and other specific costs allocations.

A. Personnel : A major thrust of our Clinton Beautification and Urban Forestation program is community involvement and working together. Thus in this project we have tried to build a coalition of help among Clinton's two small business nurserymen, Clinton Public Works Department, Clinton Parks and Recreation Department, Clinton Fire Department, and private citizens. Each of these personnel areas will be making " In - Kind " contributions of time, energy and effort toward the successful site selection, site preparation, plant selection, and assisting , when requested, Clinton Small Business nurserymen in the planting and maintenance of the trees relative to this project.

Clinton Nurserymen - Our two Clinton small business nurseries will contribute " In-Kind " help in man hours, equipment toward the planting phase of the project, supervision of the project, agronomy expertise, fertilization, pruning and detailed design of a comprehensive urban forestation plan for Clinton.

Clinton Public Works - The public works department will contribute " In-Kind " help in man hours and equipment necessary to implement and maintain the tree planting project over the next three years.

Clinton Recreation Department - recreation department employess will contribute " In-Kind " help in man hours and equipment necessary to implement and maintain those trees planted in Clinton parks as a part of this tree planting project.

Clinton Fire Department - Clinton fire department will contribute " In-Kind " help in man hours and equipment relating to watering those trees during the three year period.

Citizen Help - members of the Clinton Beautification and Urban Forestation Task Force will be involved in the planting phase of the campaign. It is important that citizens have " hands on "

experince in the project. This develops a sense of community pride and community spirit in the project.

For many years Clinton took less than a enthusiased and committed approach to urban forestation. Basically, there was not a group in Clinton that actively promoted, challenged and encouraged our citizens and government officilas to invest in urban forestation. HOwever over the past several years a new attitude toward urban forestation has gained mementurm in Clinton and the above outline reflects such a new, agressive approach to urban forestation on behalf of Clinton, Mississippi. Clinton has grown significantly in population and importance over the past decade and now stands as Mississippi's tenth largest city. It is vital that our city tap into the resources available for urban forestation so that we might significantly impact the appearance, and more importantly the public consciousness of our community.

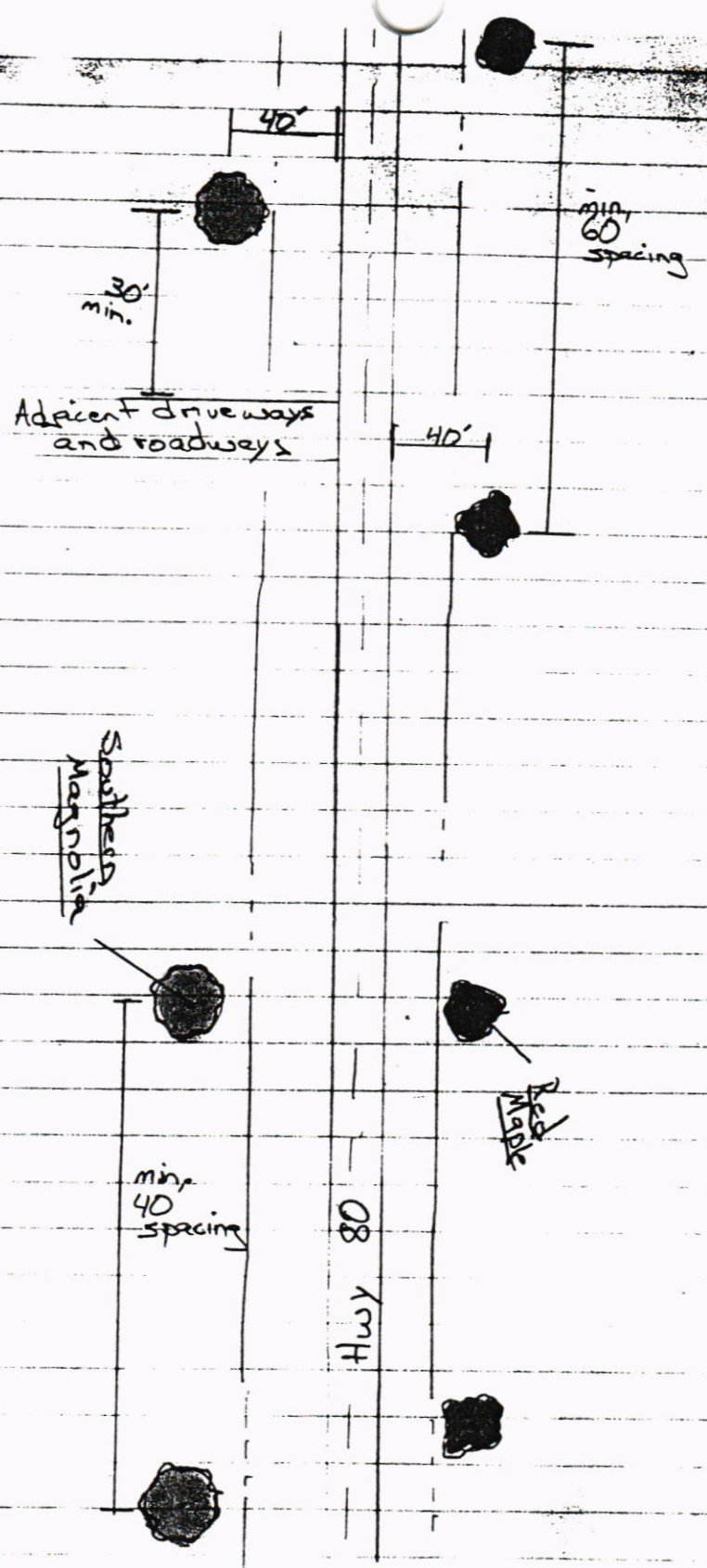

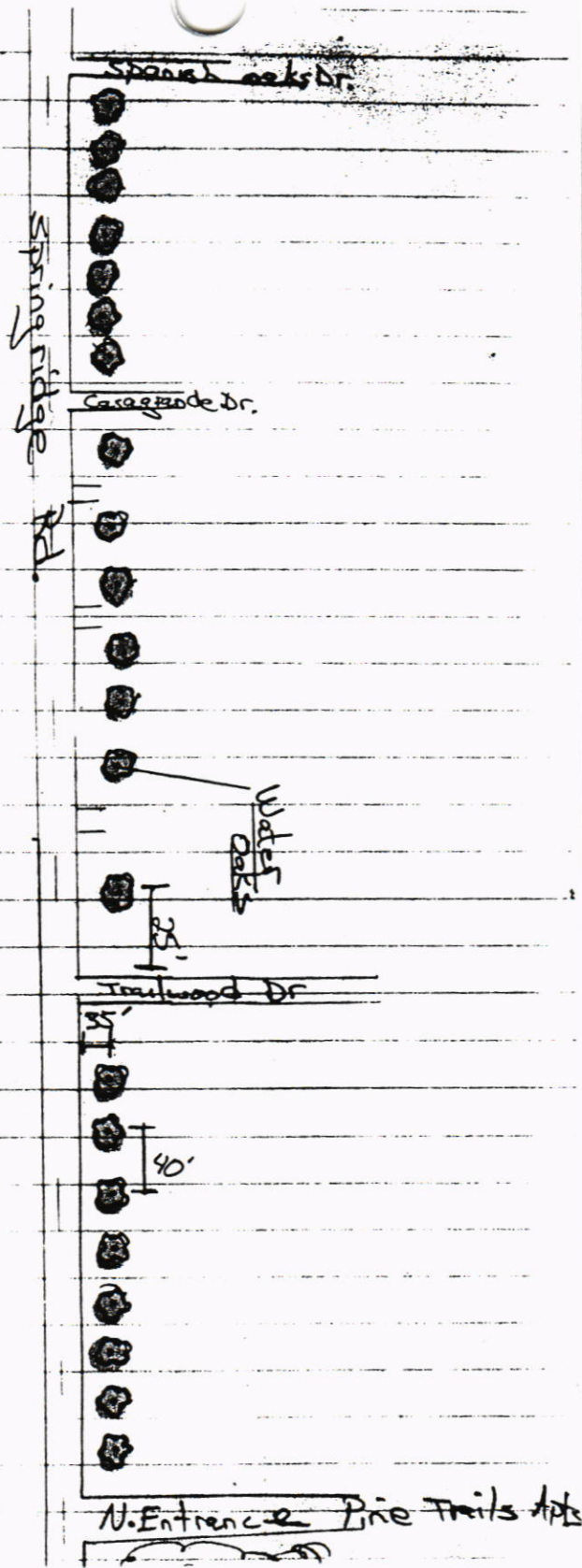
Purchasing Procedure

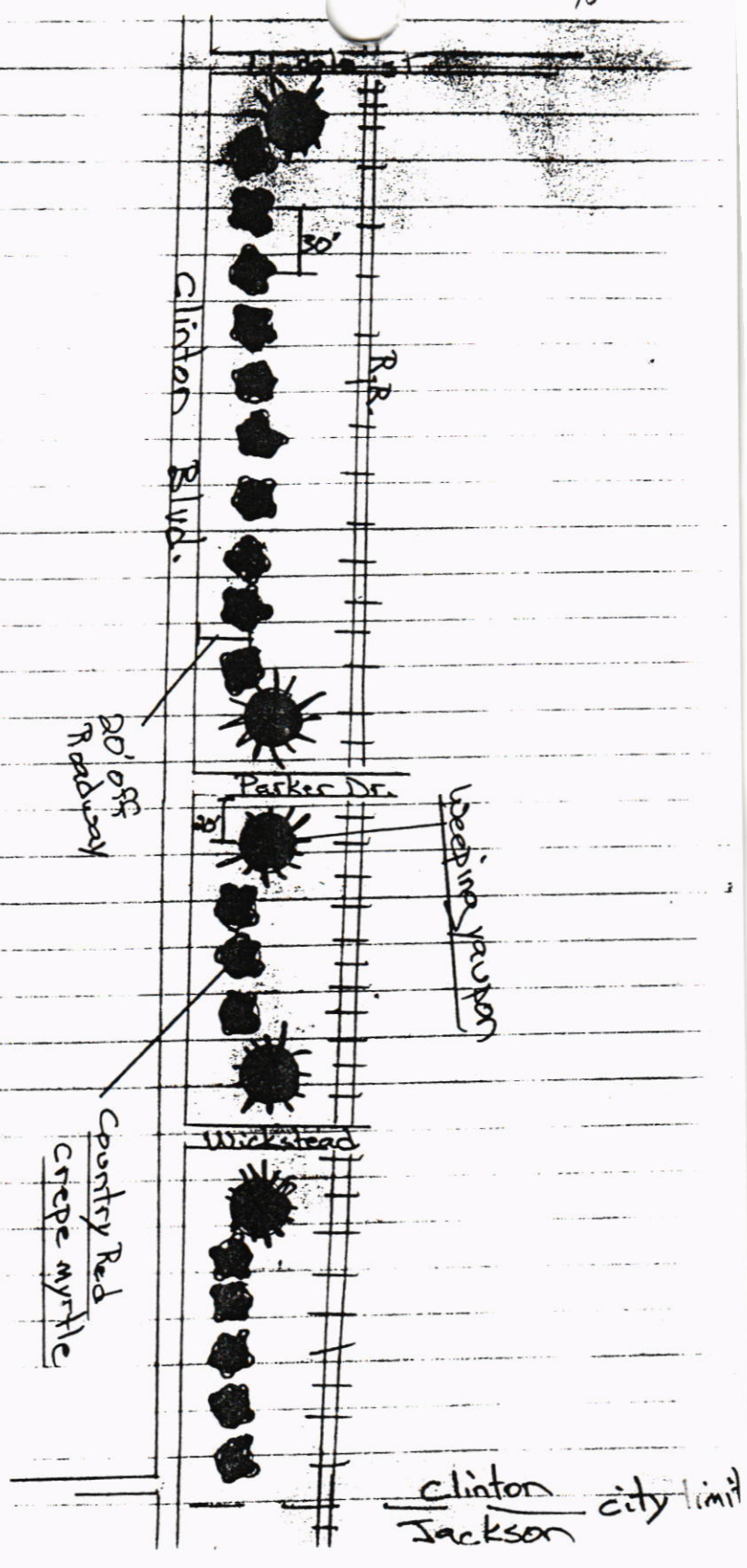


Springridge Road Project

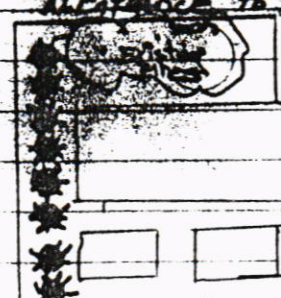

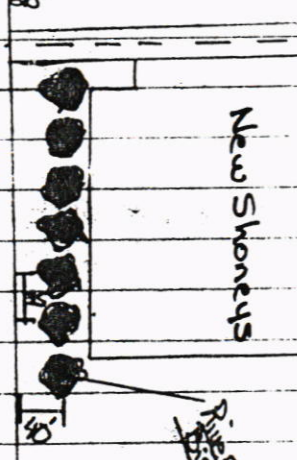

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Transportation Department has allocated fifteen percent (15%) of Fiscal Year 1992 Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program Funds to the State Aid Division for use on the Federal Aid Secondary and Federal Aid Urban Systems locally maintained;

WHEREAS, the Department, acting through its Commissioners, determined that 1.24% of deficient on-system bridges and 1.14% of deficient off-system bridges are in urban areas;

WHEREAS, under this formula, \$59,779 was allocated for on-system bridge replacement and rehabilitation, and \$54,959 was allocated for off-system bridge replacement and rehabilitation;

WHEREAS, over eighty percent (80%) of the sales tax revenues of the state, including gasoline taxes, are raised within the municipalities of the state;

WHEREAS, the Mayor and members of the Board of Aldermen or Council of the City or Town of CLINTON, MS. feel that such a distribution is inequitable and may especially ignore the needs of smaller municipalities;

WHEREAS, the landmark Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) was intended to create jobs, reduce congestion, rebuild our infrastructure, help maintain mobility, help state and local governments address environmental issues, and ensure America's ability to compete in the global marketplace of the 21st century, according to a summary of the Act by Secretary of Transportation Samuel Skinner;

WHEREAS, municipalities provide the infrastructure for business and industries which provide employment for the majority of the people of Mississippi;

WHEREAS, the provisions of ISTEA give state and local governments more flexibility in determining transportation solutions and emphasize coordinated, comprehensive and cooperative decision-making between state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman or Council of the City or Town of CLINTON, MS. are concerned that municipalities are not receiving an equitable share of all federal funds provided to the State of Mississippi under ISTEA, and again that the needs of smaller municipalities may be ignored.

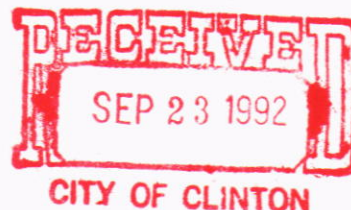

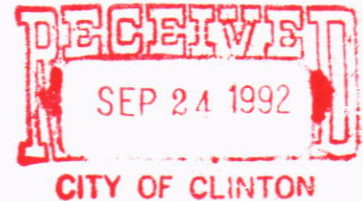

WHEREAS, the additions or expansions of equipment were completed on September 1, 1991, and as of that date the true value of all property to be exempt was Five Million Nine Hundred Seventy-Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-Four Dollars (\$5,978,734), as shown in an itemized list attached to the Application for Exemption as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the Application of Riverwood International USA, Inc., was approved by this body for submission to the Mississippi State Tax Commission which in turn certified that the properties described in the Application are eligible for exemption and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen now finding that the provisions of Section 27-31-101 et seq. have been fully complied with for the exemption;

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Clinton, Mississippi, that the Riverwood International USA, Inc. Application herein is hereby approved and that the property described in Exhibit "A" to the Application for Exemption with a value of \$5,978,734 is exempt from all ad valorem taxation, except State and School District taxation, for two (2) consecutive five-

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year periods, totaling ten (10) years, with the initial exemption period beginning on the 1st day of September, 1991, and ending on the 31st day of August, 1996, the subsequent five-year exemption period beginning on the 1st day of September, 1996, and ending on the 31st day of August, 2001; provided, that within three (3) months prior to the expiration of the initial exemption period, applicant files a request for a continuation of said exemption in accordance with Section 27-31-101 of the Mississippi Code, as amended.
